Notes:

1. For the purposes of this table, the expression 'manufactured products' includes synthetic rubber and newsprint, but does not include rawhide, acacia bark, stripped wood, pulp, raw metals (other than iron and steel products), and ores treated by screening, etc.
 2. For the purposes of this table, the term 'agricultural products' includes staple products of agricultural origin such as oilseed, leather and hides, natural rubber, wool, cotton, acacia bark and rawhide.
 3. The figures have been rounded off so as to give a general impression.
 4. Where the figures are equal to, or less than, 0.5 million pounds sterling they have little significance, given that the personal effects of migrants or the return to Great Britain of the equipment that has been used by entrepreneurs can easily correspond to the totality of these sums.
- * National exports are only in the order of 20 million pounds sterling.
