

Interview with Pasquale Antonio Baldocci: Italian political opposition to the Rome Treaties (Scy-Chazelles, 4 April 2007)

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[Pasquale Antonio Baldocci] I must tell you that the only opposition came from the Communists and one part of the Socialists. The Italian Socialists have always been terribly divided. At a certain point, there were three Socialist parties: the Social Democrats, the Socialists, and then the Socialist People's Party, which differed very little from the Communists. At that time the Communists took their instructions from Moscow; so, clearly, they were against. The Socialists were divided; the Social Democrats were in favour, as befits a centre party; the others were a little less so.
