(5) Under the WEU Assembly's Charter and Rules of Procedure, Austria being a Member State of the European Union, the members of its parliamentary delegation are automatically members of the Assembly. However, in view of Austria's specific situation under international and constitutional law, its Parliament has decided that in practice its delegation will not exercise all its membership rights.</p>
